

Threats to the Security of the Modern Family on the Example of the Crime Phenomenon Based on Data from the National Police Information System in 2020-2023

Zagrożenia bezpieczeństwa współczesnej rodziny na przykładzie zjawiska przestępczości w oparciu o dane Krajowego Systemu Informatycznego Policji w latach 2020-2023

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Abstract: The security of the modern family and of the children and young people raised within it depends on numerous factors, including military, economic, political, and social ones. Many social phenomena significantly influence families' sense of security and well-being, as well as the socialisation of children and youth. Military threats, which in today's era of attacks using unmanned aerial vehicles evoke social concerns about the outbreak of war, are one example. Cyber threats, which affect the everyday functioning of families, constitute another category of new phenomena with negative potential and impact on the basic unit of social influence. A similar phenomenon is crime. It is monitored primarily by the Police, which collects crime statistics in the National Police Information System. This study analyses these data. Its aim is to illustrate the scale of crime, including juvenile delinquency as a phenomenon posing a threat to the family, based on data collected by the Police.

Abstrakt: Bezpieczeństwo współczesnej rodziny i wychowywanych w niej dzieci i młodzieży zależy od wielu czynników, np. militarnych, gospodarczych, politycznych, społecznych. Wiele zjawisk społecznych wywiera istotny wpływ na poczucie bezpieczeństwa i byt rodziny oraz przebieg procesu socjalizacji dzieci i młodzieży. Przykładem są zagrożenia militarne, które w dobie dzisiejszych ataków przy użyciu bezzałogowych statków powietrznych wzbudzają w społeczeństwie groźbę wybuchu wojny. Cyberzagrożenia, które wywierają wpływ na funkcjonowanie rodziny w życiu codziennym, to przykład nowych zjawisk o negatywnym potencjale i wpływie na podstawową komórkę oddziaływania społecznego. Podobnym zjawiskiem jest przestępczość. Jest ona monitorowana przede wszystkim przez Policję, która gromadzi dane liczbowe na temat przestępczości w Krajowym Systemie Informatycznym Policji. Niniejsze opracowanie stanowi analizę przedmiotowych danych. Jego celem jest zobrazowanie skali zjawiska przestępczości, w tym przestępczości nieletnich, jako zjawiska stanowiącego zagrożenie dla rodziny w oparciu o dane gromadzone przez Policję.

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INTRODUCTION

The rapid pace of development in the modern world brings about numerous changes and transformations in social life, and thus in the functioning of the family as the basic unit of social influence. Innovative technologies and solutions improve the living conditions of individuals and families. Unfortunately, the development described above also creates new threats. Scientific studies present a full typology of security threats

(Dawidowicz 2007; Kaczmarczyk 2013; Fehler 2007; Wiśniewski and Falecki 2006; Sienkiewicz-Małyjurek and Niczyporuk 2010), among which crime is included as a phenomenon that directly affects the family and the children and youth raised within it. This phenomenon exerts the greatest influence on the individual's sense of security and the functioning of the family. Consequently, this issue also remains within the interest of family studies—a relatively young academic discipline. Its interdisciplinary nature is closely connected to the social sciences, theological and humanities disciplines, medical and health sciences, as well as selected engineering and agricultural sciences.

This study was developed based on an analysis of crime in Poland from 2020–2023. The research method applied aimed to illustrate the scale and developmental trends of crime based on numerical data collected in the National Police Information System. The author's intention was to analyse police data due to the possibility of examining broader datasets (compared to other statistics), containing the scope of detected crime. Attention was also given to the datasets of confirmed and adjudicated crime. The presentation of numerical data includes general police statistics, as well as data on the effectiveness of criminal prosecution and the dynamics of selected categories of crimes. The selection of specific categories of crime was based on social perception and the degree of social harm associated with offenses connected to the family. The scope of dynamics illustrates the developmental trends within the individual areas analysed. The study also includes conclusions drawn from the author's participant observation conducted over twenty-five years of investigative and preventive work.

1. SCALE OF CRIME IN POLAND

The concept of crime is understood as the number of prohibited acts committed within a given area in a defined unit of time (Hołyst 2009, 95). This phenomenon has been explained in great detail by Brunon Hołyst, who identified all its characteristic features, including its geography, structure, and dynamics. From a scientific perspective, the

issues of the emergence, development, detection, and prevention of crime fall within the scope of research in criminology, criminalistics, sociology, political science, and security studies (Bałandynowicz 1998; Hołyst 2007; Chrzanowski 2015, 33-46; Hołyst 2014; Hołyst 2013; Hołyst 2009; Koral 2009; Mikołajczyk 2015, 133-142; Mikołajczyk 2014a, 259-273; Mikołajczyk 2014b, 240-246; Zając 2015, 175-185; Sienkiewicz-Małyjurek and Niczyporuk 2011). Nevertheless, this phenomenon also remains of interest to many other scientific disciplines, including family studies.

The National Police Information System is “a set of data sets in which information, including personal data, is processed in connection with the implementation of statutory tasks” (Act of April 6, 1990, on the Police) by the Police. This database operates entirely as an ICT system. Its name officially appeared for the first time on September 5, 2007, in the regulation of the Minister of Internal Affairs and Administration. «The Chief Commander of the Police ensures the operation of a set of central information sets called the “National Police Information System (KSIP)”» (Regulation of the Ministry of Internal Affairs and Administration of September 5, 2007). In fact, KSIP was created by the Chief Commander of the Police on July 25, 2017 (Decision No. 165 of the National Police Headquarters of July 25, 2017) pursuant to the regulation of the Ministry of Internal Affairs and Administration (Regulation of the Ministry of Internal Affairs and Administration of September 29, 2015).

Ascertained crime is defined as “all acts whose nature as crimes was confirmed as a result of preparatory proceedings” (Hołyst 2009, 96), while disclosed crime is defined as the number of acts for which preparatory proceedings were initiated. The scope of statutory tasks for which the Police conducts the National Police Information Service (KSIP) covers four areas:

a) “protecting the life and health of people and property against unlawful attacks violating these rights;

b) protecting public safety and order, including ensuring peace in public places and on public transport, in road traffic, and on waters intended for general use;

c) initiating and organising activities aimed at preventing the commission of crimes and offences and criminogenic phenomena, and cooperating in this regard with state and local government authorities and social organisations;

d) detecting crimes and offences and prosecuting their perpetrators” (Act of 6 April 1990 on the Police, Art. 1).

“Currently, in criminological research on the social costs of crime, the primary focus is on the feeling of threat, fear, and living in fear of becoming a victim” (Hołyst 2015, 427). Therefore, an increase in a given category of crime can lead to heightened social anxiety and disruptions in the functioning and development of families and the individuals within them. Road safety threats, widely regarded as a key social problem in Poland, are a prime example. This type of crime is among the most widely recognised in society.

The table below presents figures on crimes reported and identified in Poland between 2020 and 2023. These figures cover all types of crimes reported to the Police and for which investigations were initiated, resulting in the crime being confirmed.

It should be noted that the scale of revealed crime differs significantly from the scale of identified crime. Therefore, not all crimes reported during preparatory proceedings were found to be criminal. The number of offences revealed in the first three years analysed increased, and the same was true for offences identified in 2020–

2021. While 2023 shows a reduction in the phenomenon, its scale indicates a significant crime threat. Therefore, crime continues to significantly affect citizens' sense of security, as well as the well-being and development of families. However, the true scale of crime remains difficult to determine, as an unknown number of offences are committed but never reported to law enforcement agencies. This is particularly relevant to crimes directly related to family life, such as domestic violence in its broadest sense, as well as crimes against life and health.

It should be emphasised that the number of crimes disclosed does not equate to the number of reports. This is due to the fact that in some cases reported to the Police, pre-trial proceedings were not initiated because, as a result of preliminary investigations, it was determined that the proceedings should be discontinued before initiation, or because the evidence collected refused to initiate proceedings. Such situations are defined in the Code of Criminal Procedure:

“Proceedings shall not be initiated, and those initiated shall be discontinued, if:

- 1) the act was not committed or there is a lack of data sufficient to justify the suspicion of its commission,
- 2) the act does not contain the elements of a prohibited act or the law stipulates that the perpetrator has not committed an offense,
- 3) the social harm of the act is insignificant,
- 4) the law stipulates that the perpetrator is not subject to punishment,
- 5) the accused has died,
- 6) the statute of limitations has expired,
- 7) criminal proceedings concerning the same act committed by the same person have been legally concluded or previously initiated are still pending,
- 8) the perpetrator is not subject to the jurisdiction of Polish criminal courts,
- 9) there is no complaint from a duly authorized prosecutor,

10) there is no required authorization for prosecution or a motion for prosecution from an authorized person, unless the law provides otherwise,

11) there is another circumstance excluding prosecution” (Act of 6 June 1997, Code of Criminal Procedure, Art. 17).

Nevertheless, the overall number of crimes identified is high. These include common crimes that directly affect family security and stability. Particularly in local communities, crime directly impacts families’ livelihoods and development prospects. For example, within the area of operation of the Warsaw Metropolitan Police Headquarters, i.e., the Warsaw metropolitan area (the city and counties immediately adjacent to Warsaw), the identified crime trends are similar to those observed nationwide. Compare with the table below.

The increase in crime between 2020 and 2022 occurred in both reported and detected crimes. A decrease in both categories was recorded in 2023.

Another area highlighted in the analysis of police datasets is the effectiveness of law enforcement, often measured by the detection rate. It is calculated as the ratio of reported crimes to detected crimes. This detection rate reflects the quality and speed of the actions taken by the police and prosecutors. In particular, the substantive preparation of police officers and prosecutors, their commitment, and the appropriate use of resources in response to the nature of the reported crime. The speed of action and the measures employed are particularly important in crimes that harm families and

undermine their well-being. One example is the use of isolation measures against perpetrators of domestic violence.

The effective work of police officers and prosecutors ensures that victims do not feel alone and are aware of the efficient operation of the justice system. In turn, the sense of impunity among perpetrators is reduced, and the preventive measures and penalties implemented have a deterrent effect on offenders. Such high rates of prosecution confirm a high level of response to crime. More than half of the identified crimes are always detected. For comparison, in 1999, the overall detection rate was only 45% of identified crimes (KGP, Crime Detection 1999-2014). Equally important is the fact that detection rates remained similar throughout the analysed years despite the constantly decreasing number of identified crimes. In summary, this indicator reflects the areas of police and prosecutorial work that impact family safety:

- adapting police structures to threats in a given area;
- professional human resources management;
- rapid response to incidents;
- police officer involvement;
- appropriate level of specialised training;
- appropriate equipment and specialised resources;
- an efficient information management system.

2. CRIMES DIRECTLY AFFECTING THE SAFETY OF THE FAMILY AND OF CHILDREN AND ADOLESCENTS RAISED WITHIN IT

The greatest impact on public safety is the crime observed every day, known as common crime. Public opinion polls show that Poles are most concerned about their safety on the road. They also fear criminal activity, such as theft, burglary, fraud, robbery, property damage, and economic crime, occurring online. The latter is the greatest threat to the socialization process of the youngest family members. Children and adolescents (often inadequately supervised by their parents) have unrestricted access to the internet, making them most vulnerable to online crime. They use applications and websites that host content unsuitable for children. Social media also allows for the creation of forums and instant messaging services where people with false identities appear. The content presented is characterised by hate, sexism, pornography, and violence. The lack of parental control breeds addiction to the internet and the content posted there. Domestic violence, crimes against life and limb, property crimes, and road safety crimes pose particular threats to family well-being. Below is data on selected crimes from the period under review.

The table shows a decline in the number of crimes, both initiated and confirmed. The seven crime categories identified include:

- brawls and assaults;
- causing bodily harm;

- heft of property;
- vehicle theft;
- burglary;
- robberies, extortions, and aggravated theft;
- property damage.

The subsets of crimes posing a threat to the family also include homicide, rape, and drug-related crimes. These are presented in the table below.

One of the most serious threats concerns road safety incidents. Although the number of road accidents is decreasing, they remain a key social problem. Data on domestic violence is included separately due to its direct impact on the family.

The scale of domestic violence is significant and constitutes the greatest threat to family well-being. It also contributes to marital breakdown and fundamentally disrupts family functioning and development. In most cases, completion of the “Blue Card” form, initiates an anti-violence procedure. Women and minors constitute the largest group of victims, while men constitute the largest group of perpetrators.

CONCLUSION

Ensuring family safety is an interdisciplinary process and requires the involvement of numerous entities and institutions, including central and local government, private entities, and citizens. A significant role in this process is played by law enforcement agencies, including the Police, responsible for ensuring the safety of citizens and maintaining public order. The Police are responsible for preventing and combating negative social phenomena, including crime and domestic violence. Domestic violence poses the greatest threat to family well-being and is also a cause of its breakdown. The “Blue Card” procedure is an effective institutional tool for addressing domestic violence; however, this is also the area in which the highest number of offences is recorded. In many cases, victims of police intervention are uninterested in pursuing the perpetrator and cooperating with law enforcement and justice authorities, as they attempt to preserve the family at all costs for emotional and economic reasons. Perpetrators may exert influence over victims due to cohabitation. The application of preventive measures against perpetrators, such as restraining orders, pre-trial detention, and police supervision, plays a significant role in protecting victims. Further safeguards

include the restrictions on a suspect's liberty specified in Article 275 § 2 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, as well as the order to periodically vacate the premises occupied by jointly by the suspect and the injured party under Article 275a § 1 of the Code of Criminal Procedure.

The intensification of negative social phenomena affects families and the children and young people raised within them. The most significant threats include common crime, road traffic crime, economic crime, and cybercrime.

In Poland, during the period under review, we have observed a decline in crime and an increase in the effectiveness of police operations. This trend should be regarded as positive and sustained, particularly in areas that are most socially harmful and detrimental to families, children, and young people. It would also be advisable to involve other services and institutions in these areas, conduct public awareness campaigns, and implement educational and training activities. This area calls for further research in family studies, security studies, and other social sciences.

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
